

(No uniforms, workwear, pillows, duvets or pieces of fabric please)



What have we been learning in Nursery?

Welcome back to another busy term!

We have had a lovely fortnight. Last week we focussed on

the story 'Going on a Bear Hunt' as a starting point for children to learn new vocab and phrases. We then moved on to discussing the weather and how we know we are in the season of Spring. The children loved going for a welly walk to re-create the story outside.

We then explored sensory trays to learn about our sense of touch to explore all of the textures that were described through the story.

This week we have read the book 'Dear Zoo' before talking about the children's experiences of animals they have seen. We then enjoyed learning about a range of habitats and talking about which animals live in different environments.

As well as developing throwing and catching skills in our PE lessons, we have also enjoyed our ballet lessons with Miss Tiki. It's been lovely to dance to the music and explore how to move our bodies in different ways.

- Please ensure your child has a PE kit in school (white t-shirt, navy shorts, and daps). There are a number of children who do not have PE kits in school.
- Please ensure that all belongings are clearly marked with your child's name including water bottles.



What have we been learning in Year 2?

The first 2 weeks of the summer term have been very busy for Year 2! We have started our new topic, 'Movers and Shakers', where we have looked at a range of significant individuals who have had an impact on our society. Our topic lessons have been a fantastic opportunity to discuss the legacy that famous people have had on our everyday lives and the children are able to recall many facts about the impact that each person has had.

In our lessons, we have been learning about:

English – We have been writing biographies about famous people. In these first 2 weeks we have focussed on Isambard Kingdom Brunel and Rosa Parks. We have learned about the lasting impact that they both have on our lives and we have recalled facts about them. Our biographies have been split into sections such as 'Who are they?', 'What did they do?' and 'What is Their Lasting Impact?'. Over the next few weeks we will be writing biographies of the other significant individuals.

Maths – We continued working on fractions last week by learning about 3/4 of shapes, amounts and numbers. This week we have just begun to tell the time using the minute and hour hands on analogue clocks. We recapped reading o'clock and half past times and then read clocks showing quarter past and quarter to. Over the next few weeks we will learn to tell the time using 5-minute intervals past and to the hour.

Science – We have recapped work on habitats then started to identify and categorise different animals. We have looked in detail at invertebrates and begun to categorise the different types by the features they have.

PE – In our PE lessons we have started to learn about net and wall games. We will be developing racquet skills

to help the children to return a ball and eventually play a racquet game against an opponent. We have also started to learn about our own fitness. We have started to control our breathing whilst exercising and managing our bodies so we can engage in physical activity for longer periods of time.

The children really enjoyed their launch of Times Tables Rockstars and it has been fantastic to see so many of them engaging with it at home as well as in school. Thank you for helping the children to dress up in their most 'rocking' outfits last week and supporting them to engage with learning their times tables facts at home.

What have we been learning in Year 3?

Wow! What a heroic start Year 3 have had to Term 5!

We loved seeing all of your villainous costumes for our hook day on the first day back and were so impressed with your imaginations. We had villains varying from Disney villains, to Bellatrix Lestrange and even environmental villains too! These villains really came to life during our drama lesson on our hook day, where they found themselves in the hot seat whilst others interviewed them about their character and experience.

Our new topic is based around music and we have enjoyed listening and comparing different pieces of music. We have also spoken about pitch and focussed on this whilst listening to The Ballard of Bonnie and Clyde. We enjoyed learning about these evil, historical villains before thinking about other villains we know from more modern stories. In PSHE, we thought carefully about what makes someone a villain and some of us had some very thoughtful opinions, such as some people only become villainous because they need help with a problem or haven't been taught how to be kind.

In English, we have been looking at newspaper reports and what features they include. We have learnt about how headlines need to sell the story whilst also telling the reader what the report is about. We have also looked at using speech marks to write quotes from witnesses. We look forward to applying the learning of these features to our own newspaper report next week.

In Science this term we are learning all about plant nutrition and reproduction. To start our topic off we have all planted sunflower seeds and over the term we will be monitoring their growth. Who will have the tallest sunflower by May half term?

We have been brilliant during our Maths unit on money. We began by recognising different coins and notes and using our knowledge of these to make different amounts. We then moved on to adding different amounts in pounds and pence before finding change from a given amount. We know that not everyone uses coins as much now, but if you have the chance to explore, add and subtract different amounts, it's a great way to keep our learning in our minds!

Our **PE** days have changed again this term to a **Monday** and a **Friday.** Our **outdoor unit** is **Athletics** this term and our indoor unit is **Tennis**. We will continue to go out in all weather, so please ensure that your child has a **full P.E. kit** in school every day.

What have we been learning in Year 4?



We've got off to a flying start this term. Our new class novel is How to Train Your Dragon and our writing topic is based around this. The children are learning how to write discussion texts this term with the goal of writing one about whether dragons should be kept as pets. In preparation for that the children have been innovating about whether dogs should be always kept on a lead. They had a fantastic debate about this week, with many of them being very articulate and making excellent points reinforced by evidence.

In Maths, the children have learned about angles. They've learned the difference between acute, obtuse and reflex angles and have completed tasks ordering and comparing them. We have then recapped our multiplication and division methods from last term, to really cement these, by looking at word problems and they have been fantastic!

We are building on our momentum from last term for TTRS and the children are really rising to meet the challenge. We want to ensure that they are as prepared as possible for the Times Table Check in June. Please remind them to complete a soundcheck game where possible. This game type is the

closest format to the Times Table Check itself. Additionally, garage mode is a really great tool for them to practice as the site's algorithm will assign questions based on what they most need.

In PE this term, we are looking at tennis and rounders. They've really enjoyed developing the coordination skills needed for tennis and it's been a great opportunity to work on team work and collaboration.

Neurodiversity Parent 101:



Why does my child react like a younger child?

Immature behaviours can look different in different children and you may notice them at specific times. You may see your child:

- · Interrupting someone else's games or leaving in the middle of it.
- Overreacting to what seems like a minor thing and taking a long time to calm down
- · Not wanting to leave your side.
- · Using "baby talk" in front of others or behaving in a 'silly manner'.
- Having trouble with things like putting on a coat or gripping a pencil.

Reasons:

- Lack of opportunity or experience being with other children so less experience of practicing social interactions and may be feeling nervous or not know what to do.
- Lack of skills in specific areas some children have delay in specific areas of their
 development. For example, they may have the coordination skills of a 7-year-old but the
 communication skills of a 4-year-old. In challenging situations where they must interact with
 other children, and they can't understand what they are saying they may act like a younger
 child because that is the stage, they are able to communicate.
- Younger than others in the group and recognize they don't have the skills
- Create a situation so they can get out of the setting they are uncomfortable in.
- Safety when we feel uncertain about who we are and how to act we sometimes revert to
 the stage where we feel safe and this may present as reacting like a younger child and /or
 needing to be near you for comfort.

How can you help your child?

- ✓ Understand your child's strengths and build on these, as this will increase your child's confidence and self esteem.
- Talk about going somewhere unfamiliar beforehand so they know what to expect and what to do if they are worried at all.
- Give them opportunity to play with other children in small groups/ or one to one before larger group interactions to start and provide some structure and for not too long. This will help your child to gain success and confidence in this setting.
- Allow them to have some time to play in a setting that feels comfortable for them (and not stressful) so they are not under pressure to perform at an age level that they are not developmentally ready to do.

WHATSAPP

LRESTRICTION 13+

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls, WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service. Its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients: not even WhatsApp itself can read them. This privacy issue has been in the spotlight recently, as the UKS Online Safey Billiproposes to end such encryption on private messaging; WhatsApp is unwilling to do so and has reportedly considered withdrawing its service in the UKS hould this legislation go ahead.

'VIEW ONCE'

The facility to send images or messages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this 'disapparing' content - but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this. diffing increased

CHAT LOCK

Another new option allows users to store certain messages or chats in a separate 'locked chats' folder, saved behind a passcode, fingerprint or face ID authentication. The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age-inappropriate material).

VISIBLE LOCATION

..TYPING...

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereobouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way home, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chat can also track their location – potentially letting strangers identify a child's home address or journeys that they make requiarly.

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency'. Plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them, alving them access.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

I o start a chat, someone only needs the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they want to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know.

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly – whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded many times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an original ... and

Advice for Parents & Carers

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

FAKE NEW

THINKING BEFORE SHARING

Help your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy — and all too common — for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhatsApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval; you can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except ...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need – and then turn it off.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you spot a 'Locked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view once' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.
